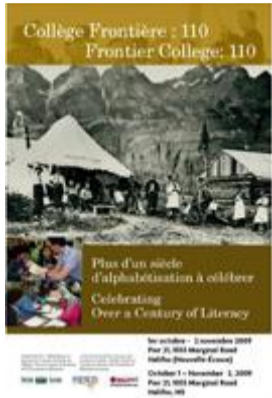




## Opening the Doors to Literacy

## Literacy Program Innovations

Reaching Learners in non-traditional learning locations



Measuring the impact of our programs is central to Frontier College's commitment to help learners reach their potential. Our research, acquired from reading assessments of program participants, focus groups and literature reviews, shows that learners are benefiting from Frontier College's one-to-one tutoring programs.

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On September 26<sup>th</sup> Frontier College held its Annual General Meeting in Toronto. We were honoured to have the Honourable Kathleen Wynne, Ontario Minister of Education, deliver the keynote address. Minister Wynne talked about the importance of community partnerships in providing educational opportunities and she commended the work of Frontier College for 110 years of providing literacy services to people of all ages in Ontario and throughout Canada, particularly those living on the margins of society and those struggling within the traditional education system.

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In the summer of 2009, with support from the Manitoba Ministries of Education, Citizenship & Youth and Aboriginal & Northern Affairs, Frontier College ran a summer literacy camp in Hollow Water First Nation, an Anishinaabe community 290km north of Winnipeg. Hiring from the community, we worked in partnership with the Recreation Coordinator at the Health Centre, Wanipigow School, Community Holistic Circle Healing, the Aboriginal Healing Foundation, community members and parents.

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
